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President's Report



As we reflect on 2022, there is no doubt that it has been a tremendously busy time for our school with significant change and growth. Our school's staff and the Board have worked with energy and passion to continue delivering the high standard of education and care to our school community, with a strong focus on working towards our strategic intent as a school (see attached) and our strategic pillars as a Board.

Our strategic vision, encapsulated across the below 4 pillars, continued to drive our decision making as a Board, whilst also supporting our school's pedagogy and play-based learning through the application of the STEAM program.

Board Strategic Pillars:

Pillar 1: Schools Pedagogy - staying true to who we are

Pillar 2: Expansion and sustainable growth of the school

Pillar 3: Being a competitive employer for teachers

Pillar 4: Streamlining and Improving processes

In addition to my first year being Chair on this Board, we were delighted to welcome 3 new members, each bringing an incredible amount of knowledge, insight and expertise into the space of education and beyond. As part of streamlining and improving our processes and to support our new members, we redeveloped our induction plan and clarified role descriptions. This helped to ensure clarity across the responsibilities and expectations within individual Board roles. In addition to this, we have started to move our members over to the Google Drive platform to ensure ease of usability and access to materials, whilst also maintaining a strong level of security.

This year the school completed their re-registration through the WA Department of Education and was granted another 5 years of operation. This process involved a rigorous audit of the school's policies, processes and procedures and required hands-on involvement from school staff, led by Principal Tanya Steers and our Board. I would like to recognise the hard work and determination required to prepare, coordinate and successfully complete such a significant task. This is a tremendous accomplishment celebrating the level of support and confidence the WA Department of Education has in the future of our school.

The pandemic brought financial uncertainty to many schools over recent years, leading to significant cost cutting measures and a slowdown in enrolment growth for many.

Fortunately, our prudent management of funds helped to limit our exposure and ensure our financial situation has remained stable throughout the year.

Our Board has also put forth a proposed revised constitution that will be presented to its members for adoption by way of special resolution at our AGM in February. While the proposed constitution will not alter the basic structure of our Board, or impact on the experience for the children within the school, it will seek to consolidate the governance and management differences, including the clearer delineation of the responsibilities of the school and the Board.

As we build momentum and continue to grow the number of student enrolments across our current offering from pre-kindy up to year 3, there continues to be excitement and anticipation from our school community around our strategic intentions to expand our offering up to year 6. We are currently exploring several locations that will provide the necessary additional physical space to accommodate our growth towards a fully-fledged primary school.

Another notable achievement from this year was the launch of HSE's Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP). This was developed using Reconciliation Australia's Narragunnawali platform, using a framework that provided whole-scale change towards reconciliation in the classroom, around the school and within the community. This process saw the school establishing a RAP working group, completing a reflection survey, writing a vision for reconciliation and adding RAP actions. On behalf of the Board, I would like to thank the entire school community as well as all staff members of Hensman Street Elementary for their continued energy and commitment over the course of the year. And a very special thanks to the Principal, Tanya Steers, for her enormous contribution in 2022 and for vibrantly living the values and pedagogy of the school.

Principal Report

A year of play, as coined by Early Childhood Australia, can only start at an amazing school such as ours. And to do so it comes down to the development and commitment of our team of phenomenal staff. What astounds me is no challenge is too big or small. This year our graduate teachers have gone above and beyond in not only their personal growth but in assisting the school in maintaining excellence in play and inquiry-based learning pedagogies.

Our biggest achievement to date has been the awarding of the WA Little Scientist award for 2022! What an amazing achievement that shows our teams (children and staff)



commitment to learning through inquiry. A big mention must go to The Ramps and Pathways Project team who created this amazing project in 2021 that we were able to nominate for this outstanding award. Thank you to Remmi Missell for leading this project. It would be remiss of me to not congratulate Mrs Christy-Lee Antonas for her ongoing support and development of our STEAM programmes here at Hensman Street Elementary. Her own accolades not to be outshone by ours allowed her to be named the inaugural National Winner of the Little Scientist

Outstanding STEM Leader award, we are so fortunate to have her as part of our team.

These STEM awards show not only HSE's commitment to early childhood education but our commitment to a hands-on play-based learning style which allows all children access into this space at such a young age. On the day of our awards ceremony, we hosted a STEMsational afternoon inviting families and our pre kindy children to join our older age groups for an amazing afternoon of hands-on stem experiences. Professor Lyn Beazley joining in together with Sibyelle from Little Scientist Australia, saw us in fits of giggles as the Elephant Toothpaste exploded!

We were so lucky to have Jane Goodwin (author) and Anna Walker (illustrator) attend the school on an authors tour sponsored by AISWA (Association of Independent Schools of WA). Our children greatly enjoyed creating a new story together and seeing how illustrations can take a great deal of time to make just for one story – a whole 2 years!

Offsite Schooling took us on an amazing adventure, not only showcasing the ability to co-construct children's learning in an outdoor setting, but also showed our children some of the amazing things they can be involved in within their community. The year took us all over the City of South Perth starting at the zoo to create individual movies around habitats and animals of interest. Understanding where animals live and how they differ from people is an interesting journey. We continued our rehabilitation of the nesting habitats at Neil McDougall Park lake which coincided with the development of a

new lake water filtration system constructed by the City of South Perth. Paul Reid from the city was able to explain the process and answer our ongoing questions regarding this. We also grew a keen interest in fungus and termites and built our own mound back at school. Term three saw us discovering the colour of Kings Park – identifying wildflowers and mapping colours throughout the various spaces, our knowledge of different texture line and colour increased through this journey. Fourth term saw us at the South Perth foreshore located near the newly built Djirda Miya (home of the birds – in Noongar), where the children became avid bird watchers, taking part in the annual bird count, and graphing and mapping the changes in bird migration over the term.

Our sports day was rained out, however we combined it with our Christmas concert for an extravaganza. A special mention to team Djiti Djiti for the win, and to Daniel Axford for taking out the Llyod Parent cup.

This year's concert was an event not to be missed which opened with our Year 2 class speaking our own acknowledgement of Country in Noongar. What a treat! Our values award winners for this year were:

- Devansh Sachin Dev (Empathy)
- Mia Axford (Responsibility)
- Theo Trengove (Belonging).
- Harrison Brown (Creativity)

And our Two little Scientist winners were Charlotte Foley (k-2) and Jasper Reeves (Pre-kindy)

I would like to sign off by acknowledging the dedication of the Volunteer Board, and the Staff of Hensman Street, and wish you all a safe and happy holiday period.

Treasurer's Report



Hensman Street Elementary Board continues to do an amazing job to ensure the school runs smoothly on the financial resources it has available. Hensman Street Elementary ('school') is primarily funded by parent fees and Government funding. There are also additional monies raised via fundraising.

A profit of \$74,244 was recorded for the 2022 calendar year (2021: \$40,353 loss). This profit includes a non-cash expense component of around \$9,199 which is an accrual for future annual leave and long service leave. The profit also includes the

accrual income for those students enrolled in the first term in 2023. This amounts to \$53,930. These are due to be received by the 31st January 2023.

The cash balance at the end of December 2022 was \$155,035 (2021: \$140,586), after taxes (GST & PAYG), superannuation payable and leave accruals, the net position is \$138,968 (2021: \$64,723).

Significant events for the year included:


- Increased fundraising which included Hot Cross Buns, Pasta Drive and Bunnings Sausage Sizzle;

- Wages continue to make up the major expense item of the school. This is to ensure the staffing levels were met.

INDEPENDENT AUDIT REPORT

To: THE MEMBERS OF HENSMAN STREET PRE-SCHOOL GROUP INC.

Scope

Financial reports and Members' Responsibility

The financial reports presented for audit by the members indicate the financial performance and financial position of the association for the period 1 January 2022 to 31 December 2022. My audit was based on the supporting data presented to me by the members of the association. The members are responsible for preparing and maintaining adequate accounting records and internal controls that are designed to prevent fraud and error and for the accounting policies and accounting estimates inherent in the financial reports.

The members have determined that the association is a non-reporting entity and that the financial reports are therefore special purpose financial reports, which do not require the application of all accounting standards in Australia or other particular financial reporting requirements. The members have determined that the accounting policies used are consistent with the association's financial reporting requirements and are appropriate to meet the needs of the users of these reports. No opinion is expressed as to whether the accounting policies used are appropriate to the needs of the users of the financial reports.

Audit Approach

I conducted an independent audit of the financial reports in order to express an opinion to the members. My audit was conducted in accordance with the Australian Auditing Standards to provide reasonable assurance as to whether the financial reports are free of material misstatement. The nature of an audit is influenced by factors such as the use of professional judgement, selective testing, the inherent limitations of internal control and the availability of persuasive rather than conclusive evidence. Therefore, an audit cannot guarantee that all misstatements have been detected.

I performed procedures to assess whether in all material respects the financial reports represent fairly, in compliance with Accounting Standards in Australia and other mandatory financial reporting requirements in Australia, a view which is consistent with my understanding of the association's cash flow position and of it's performance which is represented by the results of it's operations.

I formed my opinion on the basis of these procedures, which included:

- examining on a test basis, information to provide evidence, supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial reports,
- assessing the appropriateness of the accounting policies and disclosures used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by the members.

Whilst I considered the effectiveness of management's internal controls over financial reporting when determining the nature and extent of my procedures, my audit was not designed to provide assurance on internal controls. I performed procedures to assess whether the substance of business transactions were accurately reflected in the financial reports. These and our other procedures did not include consideration or judgement of the appropriateness or reasonableness of the business plans or strategies adopted by the members and management of the association.

Independence

I have met the independence requirements of the applicable Australian Professional Ethical Pronouncements and the Corporations Act 2001.

The audit opinion expressed in this independent audit report has been formed on the above basis.

In my opinion, the financial reports for the period 1 January 2022 to 31 December 2022 give a true and fair view of the association's performance and cash flow for the respective period and comply with Australian Accounting Concepts and applicable Accounting Standards.

Grants Report

With no board role designated to Grants this year, the school itself applied for a few smaller grants and were successful.

To continue our sporting program we would like to thank Sporting Schools Australia who provide small grants to schools to cover the delivery costs of teaching different sports to children. Our children this year were exposed to Tennis, football (soccer) and gymnastics.

To continue to embed our Noongar Program and aboriginal cultural awareness we were awarded a two year grant from PALS, to use student voice and histories to develop a school shirt. We are very much looking forward to this coming to fruition this year.



Compliance Report

2022 was another important year for school policies and processes, with a significant portion of this work being undertaken for the school's re-registration in accordance with the *School Education Act 1999*. This was a significant undertaking, resulting in the School being accorded Registration for a period of Five Years. On behalf of the Board, I would like to commend the staff, led by the Principal for their efforts to complete the reregistration.

Furthermore it is noted that there have continued to be a number of further requests for clarification of various issues in regard to numbers, hours of tuition and other curriculum areas. All these requests have resulted in the workload of staff, especially the Principal, being further challenged. For her diligence in regard to these matters I would again commend Tanya.

Since accepting the role of Compliance Director, I have spent time reviewing practices and duties assumed by members of the Board. To this end, and in consultation with the Principal and our Board Chair, a review of the responsibilities, roles and duties of Board members has been completed. Some of the proposed changes to the language and description of the various formal roles currently in place, and composition of the Board, including the number of members required for Hensman Elementary School may eventually require changes to the Constitution as it stands.

With the prospect of a school expansion, this would appear to be an appropriate time for the Board to reconsider its Role and therefore the composition and requirements of the members. This will be reported upon at the first meeting of the Hensman Elementary School Board at the commencement of the 2023 school year.
